




Power of Choice

We seem to be living during a crazy time in the world. A time where labeling and judging people before we even know them seems to be a prev-







Reverend James Crowley Independence Day

As Independence Day approaches, have you ever wondered what happened to those men who signed the Declaration of Independence? Five signers were captured by the British as traitors, and tortured before they died. Twelve had their homes ransacked and burned. Two lost their sons in the Revolutionary Army, another had two sons captured. Nine of the 56 fought and died from wounds or the hardships of the Revolutionary War. What kind of men were they? Twenty-four were lawyers and jurists. Eleven were merchants, nine were farmers and large plantation owners, men of means, well educated. But they signed the Declaration of Independence knowing full well that the penalty would be death if they were captured.

They signed and they pledged their lives, their fortunes, and their sacred honor. Carter Braxton of Virginia, a wealthy planter and trader, saw his ships swept from the seas by the British navy. He sold his home and properties to pay his debts, and died in rags. Thomas McKeam was so hounded by the British that he was forced to move his family almost constantly. He served in the Congress without pay, and his family was kept in hiding. His possessions were taken from him, and poverty was his reward.

Vandals or soldiers or both, looted the properties of Ellery, Clymer, Hall, Walton, Gwinnett, Heyward, Ruttledge, and Middleton. At the Battle of Yorktown, Thomas Nelson Jr., noted that the British General Cornwallis, had taken over the Nelson home for his headquarters. The owner quietly urged General George Washington to open fire, which was done. The home was destroyed, and Nelson died bankrupt. Francis Lewis had his home and properties destroyed. The enemy jailed his wife, and she died within a few months.

John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside as she was dying. Their 13 children fled for their lives. His fields and his grist mill were laid waste. For more than a year he lived in forests and caves, returning home after the war to find his wife dead, his children vanished. A few weeks later he died from exhaustion and a broken heart. Norris and Livingston suffered similar fates.

Such were the stories and sacrifices of the American Revolution. These were not wild-eyed, rabble-rousing ruffians. There were soft-spoken men of means and education. They had security, but they valued liberty more. Standing tall, straight, and unwavering, they pledged: "For the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of the Divine Providence, we mutu-

ally pledge to each other, our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor." As we celebrate our freedom this Fourth of July, let us not forget those who came before us and sacrificed so much.

Beginnings

The older gentleman was about to leave the young man with tears in his eyes, who was lying in the hospital bed. The younger man had told him his story of pain and

lost confidence. The younger man pleaded "if you can you spare a few more minutes I need to ask a question." "Well son, what else is on your mind?"

"Will you teach me to pray? I mean really pray, not just a prayer I learned as a child in Sunday School or church. I have used those, yet you just opened up and I heard what I needed. I was comforted and encouraged to take some action. I had given up hope of being a man or having anything to offer anyone else. How did you learn to do that?"

The older man paused for a few seconds then said, "OK, I'll tell you about my beginnings. I was younger than you, still a teenager. Grew up on a farm. There had been a terrible accident with a large piece of equipment and my brother was severely injured and had lost his leg. He was perfectly certain it was my fault. My brother was angry at everyone and everything, especially me. The insurance investigator and the police that came said it was a malfunction of the machine that threw him to the ground. I found it impossible to be around him. There was no telling him I didn't cause all his pain and agony. After once again trying to talk to him and once again failing, I went outside the hospital and was sitting on a bench. A young man came over and sat near me. He seemed to see the pain on my face. He asked if he could pray for me. I thought, pray for me. It's my brother that needs the prayers. Lots of people from our community were praying for him. Then young man asked again if he could pray for me.

This time I said, "Yes." Maybe a prayer would help me to not give up the hope that my brother would not always hate me. And the man closed his eyes, bowed his head and was quiet for a good while. Know your answer will come at the right and perfect time in the right and perfect way for you. There's my ride, got to go."

It took me a while to be able to do what that stranger told me on a regular basis. Yet once I got myself in that routine, I wouldn't give it up. I always have time here and there to check in, and say "Thanks and ask for answers". By the way, my brother and I are best friends and have been for years now. There were several things that put us back together. I'm sure that stranger outside the hospital and his advice was the start of that healing. I thank God for that man showing me a new beginning.

What is Metaphysical Bible Interpretation?

Metaphysical Bible interpretation is looking past the literal words in the Bible and creating an interpretation that connects to each one of us in the spiritual journey of our soul. The Bible was written in very violent times and therefore written with a lot of symbology. Therefore, Charles Fillmore spent thousands of hours in meditation focusing on the Hebrew names of people and places in the Bible. This inspired him with descriptions of a "state of consciousness" that each character or symbol represents in the Bible. And the challenges that each character moves through in order to grow on their spiritual journey. He believed that each story in the Bible is a story that teaches us something about what is going on inside of us as we move through life.

Charles Fillmore put together a book called the Metaphysical Bible Dictionary that gives you all the names and places in the Bible and what that name or place spiritually represents within us. This making the Bible a story about the unfoldment of your soul.

There are so many things in the Bible that help us to move through every challenge. Jesus taught, "When you pray, do not be like the hypocrites, for they love to pray standing in the synagogues and on the street corners to be seen by men ... but when you pray, go into your room, close the door and pray to your father who is unseen."

What does Jesus mean by that? Why should someone not stand in the synagogue and on the street corner and pray? Jesus believe that these men are praying so the world can see them. Making it more an outer action so the world can see how devoted they are to God. A display of asking for help from a God outside themselves. Jesus states not to do this. He suggests going into a room and closing the door which means we are to connect to the power and presence of God that is within us. To close the door on the outer world and connect to the Divine that is with us.

Jesus continues to say "And when you pray, do not heap up empty phrases as the Gentiles do, for they think that they will be heard for their many words. Do not be like them, for your Father knows what you need before you ask him. So God knows what we need, yet we are always told to ask. "To ask and it shall be given unto you according to your faith." Just maybe asking means to claim. To claim the truth of your oneness with God, to claim your divinity and allow God to create in and through you all your answers to prayer. When Jesus was asked how do we pray by the disciples, this is what he said.

Our Father, who art in heaven hallowed be thy name. This first sentence all by itself tells us to feel united with God who Jesus calls Father. This creating a very personal relationship to God. He says "Our Father" not my Father which means we are all united in our spiritual essence.



This feeling of oneness is the key to prayer. This will stop the feeling of being separate from God. We must shut the door on the world of appearance and in order to achieve a greater awareness to the truth of who we are in the spiritual realm called heaven. Step into the light of grace and allow the answers to come to you. Praying is absolutely an inside job. It is a process to make that connection and claim the truth. We claim the truth by say I am prosperous, I am healthy. I am wealthy. I am wise. I am peace. I am joy. Delight yourself in God. Prayer should not be a chore. There is no greater power than unifying with God. Rejoice in the Lord always because God is within you. Immerse our mind with the mind of God. What a glorious feeling that would be to experience!
